- Provides youth advocates with the training and resources necessary to extend their influence and actively shape the programs and policies that affect their lives


Background

Talimba's Project: Goals


- Build the skills of young people to advocate for access to female condoms in Malawi's Dedza district
 - Raise young people's awareness of the importance of female condoms, reduced cultural barriers surrounding young people's access to contraception, and advocated for an increased supply of female condoms at 4 local health facilities



Dedza District Profile

- Percentage of women aged 15-19 who have begun childbearing in the district is 24.9
- Percent distribution of currently married women age 15-49 who have use any modern contraception method in Dedza 62.1
- Percentage of currently married women age 15-49 with unmet need for family planning 16.7

Talimba's Project: Successes

- Trained 15 youth advocates
- Held 12 meetings with service providers from 4 health facilities to develop a plan to distribute 3,200 female condoms
- Reached over 7,600 community members and 1,200 young people through meetings and community events



Results

- Small grant projects demonstrate that young people themselves are effective experts in and advocates for their own SRHR
- Model of providing a combination of technical and financial support enables young people to engage and influence the programs and policies so they are effective and responsive to young people
