The Reproductive Health Supplies Coalition (RHSC) is seeking to fill a new senior leadership position of Director, Implementing Mechanisms and Initiatives (IMI). Based in <u>any PATH office in Africa</u>, the IMI Director will provide technical leadership within RHSC's current <u>Strategy (2015-2025)</u> and program of action (<u>Money, Markets and Movement</u>) and work to ensure RHSC Implementing Mechanisms are highly effective. The IMI Director will manage a team providing technical and administrative support to RHSC's working groups and caucuses and will provide leadership for RHSC's General Membership Meeting. They will also bring additional reproductive health (RH) market expertise to RHSC, working directly with RHSC's Market Development Approaches Working Group and engaging with other Secretariat staff working on market issues and with key partners in this area. These scholarships seek to motivate young professionals from low- and middle-income countries (LMICs) to join the field of health SCM. Girls on the Move graduate

Thirty-six young women celebrated the completion of their eight-month supply chain management (SCM) internships with hospitals, hotels, and other public and private sector agencies in Kisumu County, Kenya, and Nairobi. Developed and managed by Pamela Steele Associates (PSA), the Girls on the Move program was designed to bridge the gap between education and employment, and 13 graduates have been offered full-time employment by their mentor-employers. The interns received certificates signed by the Governor of Kisumu at a ceremony attended by County Ministers for Education, for Health, and for Gender, Youth and Sport. Several employers are in discussion with PSA for future support of young female interns in SCM, and PSA is looking at opportunities for scale-up. Ghana Health Service reiterates commitment to GMM 2023

At a meeting with RHSC Director Martyn Smith in Accra this month, Ghana Health Service (GHS) Director-General Dr. Patrick Aboagye reiterated Ghana's commitment to co-hosting the upcoming General Membership Meeting in October this year. Dr. Aboagye, Dr. Kofi Issah, Director Family Health Division, and Claudette Diogo, Logistics and Supply Manager, shared their thoughts on a wide range of RH supplies issues ranging from COVID-19 adaptations and solutions, to commodity financing, and family planning within national health insurance. The

discussion has informed the GMM2023 planning process richly and we thank the GHS and all our partners in Ghana for their advice and support in the leadup to our meeting in October.

14 LAC candidates awarded LAPTOP scholarships

Fourteen candidates in the Latin America and Caribbean region (LAC) are starting new courses of study in supply chain management, thanks to ForoLAC's latest round of LAPTOP scholarships. The eight women and six men are from Haiti, Bolivia, Peru, Guatemala, Honduras, Nicaragua, Argentina, and Colombia.
